Progression Opportunities	The qualification sits within a suite of progressive coaching sport qualifications, and based on the role the coach is playing can support direct progression onto the <i>England Hockey Coach Course – Advanced Coach Programme</i> . This qualification may lead to paid employment or voluntary roles coaching sessions in hockey either working independently or as part of a coaching team.						

Qualification Objective
What does this qualification cover?
This qualification is designed to provide a benefit to learners on the basis that it prepares them for employment as a hockey coach. Achievement of the qualification services to ensure that the learner will have the skills and experience necessary to be able to coach independently, and plan, deliver and review linked and progressive sessions.
Who is the qualification for?
The qualification is designed for those who have a minimum of 2 years' experience of delivering relevant hockey sessions and have an insight into the new GB Coaching Strategy through holding the relevant pre-requisites. This course is suitable for those who are the regular coaches of a hockey programme (ie Club Team or School Team over a season, JDC or JAC)
Who supports this qualification?
The qualification is recognised as the industry standard level 2 qualification for session coaches in hockey by England Hockey, Great Britain Hockey, Hockey Wales and Scottish Hockey. It is further supported by UK Coaching.
The support is focused on the benefits of the qualification for learners, the objective of the qualification and the predicted learner demand. This information was gathered through valid research and consultation with a range of stakeholders including potential employers and the delivery workforce for hockey qualifications.

Qualification Progression
What future education could this qualification lead to?
The qualification sits within a suite of progressive coaching sport qualifications, and based on the role the coach is playing can support direct progression onto the <i>England Hockey Coach Course – Advanced Coach Programme</i> . The skills and knowledge developed may also be used to enable learners to progress to other industry-relevant qualifications in coaching sport, physical activity, activity leadership, supporting PE in school sport and sports development.
What future employment could this qualification lead to?
This qualification may lead to paid employment or unpaid voluntary roles coaching sessions in hockey either working independently or as part of a coaching team.
Qualification Achievement
Entry Requirements for the Qualification
<p>Prior to registration for the qualification learners are required to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • be accurately identified • be 18 years of age or over • be able to communicate effectively in English¹ (this includes listening, speaking, reading and writing) • be able to evidence delivery of relevant hockey sessions over the previous 24 months • be able to evidence the need for this qualification linked to current or future coaching role • have attended 6 hours of England Hockey CPD in the past 2 years or hold a UKCC Level 1 Hockey Qualification or a teaching qualification or be an active & qualified UKCC Level 1 coach in another comparable sport. <p>Prior to certification for the qualification, learners are required to have attended a recognised safeguarding workshop (not online).</p>

¹Learners must be able to understand the requirements of the qualification and the information within the qualification materials in English without assistance. Where there is demand, this qualification may also be available in Welsh or Irish.

How is the Qualification Achieved?
This qualification is normally achieved through attending a programme of learning and assessment.
What will be assessed?
<p>Achievement of the qualification is normally through attendance on a course of training and assessment. The assessment specification requires learners to complete standardised tasks by 1st4sport to create a portfolio of evidence which includes:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • development of a hockey coach profile and a profile of players • inclusive practice activity • assessment of risks • plan, delivery and review of four linked sessions, sessions for different participants and a simulated coaching session in hockey. • observation of coaches • personal development plan <p>The standardized tasks are inclusive of all assessment criteria and sourced via the web based online e-portfolio <i>My Training Diary</i> delivered by England Hockey. Successful completion will result in the achievement of the qualification.</p>

How will it be assessed?	
<p>This qualification contains a range of units to be completed by the learner. Each unit is comprised of a number of learning outcomes and identified assessment criteria to be completed.</p> <p>Learning Outcomes that begin ‘The learner will understand...’ will be assessed through theory based activities.</p> <p>Learning Outcomes that begin ‘The learner will be able to...’ are assessed through practical activities.</p> <p>For example:</p>

Qualification Delivery

What workforce is needed to be able to deliver this qualification?

The recognised centre is required to have a qualified and competent qualification workforce in place which includes as a minimum.

- a qualification administrator
- a qualification coordinator
- an appropriately qualified tutor; examples of accepted qualifications: *Level 3 Award in Education and Training; Level 3/4 Award in Preparing to Teach in the Lifelong Learning Sector (PTLLS); 1st4sport Level 3 Award in Delivering Learning (L3ADLQ); 1st4sport Level 3 Certificate in Tutoring Sport (CTS); Level 4 Certificate in Education and Training; Level 5 Diploma in Education and Training; Level 3/4 Certificate in Teaching in the Lifelong Learning Sector (CTLLS); Level 5 Diploma in Teaching in the Lifelong Learning Sector (DTLLS); Post Graduate Certificate in Education*
- an appropriately qualified assessor; examples of accepted qualifications: *Level 3 Award in Assessing Vocationally Related Achievement; Level 3 Certificate in Assessing Vocational Achievement; A1 Assess candidate performance using a range of methods.*
- an appropriately qualified internal quality assurer (IQA); examples of accepted qualifications: *Level 4 Award in Internal Quality Assurance of Assessment Processes and Practice; Level 4 Certificate in Leading the Internal Quality Assurance of Assessment Processes and Practice; 1st4sport Level 3 Certificate in Internal Verification Practice in Sport (CIVPS); V1 Conduct internal quality assurance of the assessment process.*

What facilities are needed to be able to deliver this qualification?

The recognised centre is required to have one or more delivery sites which contain facilities to support the delivery of the full programme of training and assessment. All delivery sites must comply with accepted health and safety practices for hockey and have in place appropriate access arrangements. All training and/or assessment sites must include the following facilities:

- artificial turf hockey pitch with flood lights
- minimum two pairs of goals
- covered dug outs
- access to shelter, changing rooms and toilet facilities
- a theory space for up to 20 learners with tables and chairs
- toilet facilities.

Ideally, where possible there should also be an area/indoor space to use for carrying out practical activities in inclement weather conditions.

The weather and environment must be conducive to learning; lighting and temperature appropriate to the participant and learner needs. The space surrounding the playing area must be safe and free of obstructions.

What equipment is needed to be able to deliver this qualification?

The recognised centre is required to have equipment in place to facilitate the full programme of learning and assessment which must comply with accepted health and safety practice for hockey.

The recognised centre must ensure that all learners and persons being coached wear appropriate sports apparel including correct footwear for the playing surface and a whistle. Goalkeepers should wear full protective clothing and it is strongly encouraged for learners to use:

- shin guards
- mouth guards

Other essential centre equipment includes:

- IT equipment including lap top, projector, extension cable and screen or similar
- Flip-chart, easel, paper and pens.
